### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2022

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2022. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Objectives and aims

To work towards eliminating discrimination, to promote equality of opportunity and good relations between all persons in the Borough of Charnwood, in the County of Leicestershire.

The trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

#### ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

#### Charitable activities

As a strategic partner of Charnwood Borough Council, the charity continued to play a major role in promoting community cohesion by co-ordinating inter-faith and inter-cultural events including Loughborough Mela. The charity continued to work with like-minded partners.

The charity's Five-Year Big Lottery funded project (Positive Minds Project) is in its fourth year and focuses on mental health work among the BAME community.

The charity secured a five-year contract with Vita Health to deliver a project on mental health and referrals. This started in April 2021.

The charity secured funding from The Community Justice Fund (Access for Justice) in April 2021 for general casework.

The charity secured funding from Leicestershire County Council in April 2021 for general casework.

The charity secured a grant of £9k towards new computers and training room renovations in February 2022. This will spent during 2022/23.

The charity secured funding from Lloyds Bank Foundation in March 2022 to support our core work, over two years.

The Time to Shine project funded by the Rank Foundation ended in January 2022.

#### COVID 19

Trustees were committed to abiding by Government advice and instructions regarding the Covid pandemic and continued to ensure compliance with all regulations.

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

#### Financial position

The charity has total funds carried forward of £231,640 (2021: £195,018) made up of unrestricted funds of £136,148 (2021: £119,791) and restricted funds of £95,492 (2021: £75,227).

#### Going concern

Trustees are confident the charity has sufficient resources to meet its obligation to funders and clients during 2022 - 2023.

### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### Governing document

The charity is a company limited by guarantee. The charity's objects are to work towards eliminating discrimination and to promote equality of opportunity and good relations between all persons in the Borough of Charnwood, in the County of Leicestershire. The charity is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 19 August 2008.

New trustees are introduced to the workings of the charity. Trustees are encouraged to identify training needs and attend appropriate external courses. It administers the charity and meets monthly. There are subcommittees responsible for membership, personnel, finance and property, marketing and publicity.

#### Wider network

During the year financial support was given by Charnwood Borough Council and The National Lottery Community Fund and other national funders to carry out work programmes for them

The charity works in partnership with statutory, voluntary agencies and with community groups, these include Charnwood Borough Council, The Bridge, Citizen's Advice Bureau, Living Without Abuse, John Storer Charnwood, Fearon Hall and Loughborough Council of Faiths.

#### Risk management

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to them. A key element in the management of financial risk is the setting of a reserves policy and its regular review by trustees. Trustees have resolved to ensure that the charity is able to continue to provide all services for a period of at least two months in the event of a significant proportion of our income not being realised and also, in the event of having to come to a close, sufficient funds to meet all its obligations.

In order to meet these obligations, the trustees have set a minimum level of £35,000 for the charity's free reserves.

#### Disclosure of information to the Independent examiner

Each of the trustees has confirmed that there is no information of which they are aware which is relevant to the independent examination, but of which the independent examiner is unaware. They have further confirmed that they have taken appropriate steps to identify such relevant information and to establish that the independent examiner is aware of such information.

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2022

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The financial statements contain information about Equality Action Ltd as an individual charitable company.

The financial statements are presented in £ Sterling and are rounded to the nearest pound.

The charitable company is a public benefit entity as defined by FRS102.

The going concern basis is dependent on the charity continuing to receive grant funding.

The funding received from The Big Lottery Positive Minds grant is secure until July 2023.

Furthermore, the charity secured a Strategic Partnership Agreement with Charnwood Borough Council from April 2020 to March 2022 and has secured funding for 5 years from VITA Health starting April 2021.

The trustees are confident that the grant funding will continue on a basis that will provide the charity with sufficient resources for the foreseeable future.

#### **Going Concern**

Following the impact of Covid-19 in 2020/21, the charity was better able to provide its charitable activities during 2021/22.

The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

#### Financial reporting standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

The charitable company has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemptions in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland':

the requirements of Section 7 Statement of Cash Flows.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Income from government and other grants is recognised at fair value when the charity has entitlement after any performance conditions are met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably. If entitlement is not met then these amounts are deferred.

#### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings—that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have—been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

#### Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets costing more than £500 are capitalised and included at cost including any incidental expenses on acquisition.

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# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - continued FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2022

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

#### Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses. Cost includes costs directly attributable to making the asset capable of operating as intended.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets, at rates calculated to write off the cost, less estimated residual value, of each asset on a systematic basis over its expected useful life as follows:

Fixtures and fittings 15% reducing balance
Office equipment 25% reducing balance

No depreciation is provided on the charity's property as it is the organisation's policy to maintain this so as to extend it's useful life

#### **Taxation**

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

The Charity is not required to register for VAT. All income and expenses include VAT where applicable.

#### Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

### Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

#### Debtors and creditors receivable / payable within one year

Debtors and creditors with no stated interest rate and receivable or payable within one year are recorded at transaction price. Any losses arising from impairment are recognised in expenditure.

#### Critical accounting judgements and estimation uncertainty

In the application of the charitable company's accounting policies, management is required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying value of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and underlying assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

There are no critical accounting judgements or estimation uncertainty that, in the opinion of the trustees, will have a material effect on the financial statements.

#### Termination payments

Termination payment liabilities are recognised upon communication of intention to pay and when quantifiable. Such payments are accounted for as staff costs.

Awards for All is funding for the purchase of computer equipment.

The Big Lottery Improving Lives is a 5 year Big Lottery project empowering men from a South Asian background.

The Good Things Foundation grant was to provide English classes for BAME women.

The Big Lottery Positive Minds Grant is a 5 year Big Lottery project in raising awareness and offering support for mental health issues to BAME people.

The National Lottery Beyond Lockdown project is a partnership initiative of community groups working in Loughborough East to support people affected by the Covid situation.

The Access for Justice Casework project is funding for casework, running expenses and debt training.

The Charnwood Borough Council Covid Grant was awarded September 2020 to enable the charity to adapt its premises to accommodate Covid restrictions.

The Access for Justice Leadership project is funding for Executive Officer salary (£2,500) for leadership training and external consultants for the Access for Justice project.

The Good Things Foundation Census is a contract for the Office for National Statistics to deliver 2021 Census support to the public with funding for DBS checks, training and delivery hours.

The Time To Shine Leadership Programme is funding to enable individuals with the right skills mix, talent and work ethic, the opportunity to experience a 12- month paid leadership and development placement in a charity.

The Tech For Schools project was the charity's response to the local need for schoolchildren to be able to use laptops at home during the Covid crisis in 3 ways:

- 1. By coordinating the collection of old laptops and their delivery to Limehurst Academy.
- 2. A few people chose to donate money to Equality Action via PayPal. This was used to purchase computers and deliver to Limehurst Academy.
- 3. By setting up an Amazon wish-list for the public to pay for equipment directly (no money coming to the charity).

The VITA Health fund above is in respect of a new project beginning in April 2021. This fund was overdrawn at the year end due to initial set up costs of this project, incurred in the year, prior to the commencement of this project.

#### Transfers between funds

#### Big Lottery Chances For All and Charnwood Disability Forum

These projects have been completed and formally agreed and signed off by the respective funders. Upon review by the trustees, it was considered that these are not restricted balances set aside for specific purposes, they are residual balances which should be cleared down, and as such, these have been transferred to the general fund to formally close these funds.

#### Big Lottery Improving Lives

The expenditure of this project was recognised in the financial statements across the life of this project based on the actual project costs. However, it was agreed throughout the project that the Charity could claim the full cost of this project factoring in apportioned running costs associated with this.

These apportioned costs were recognised within the general fund throughout the project. Upon completion of this project there was a balance left on this fund because of these. The trustees note retrospectively that these should have been allocated to this fund throughout this project.

Therefore, given the fund provider has formally signed off this project as completed, the trustees consider it reasonable to transfer this remaining balance to the general fund to effectively repay these apportioned costs spent out of the general fund throughout the project.

#### Big Lottery Positive Minds

In light of the above adjustment to the improving Lives fund, the ongoing Positive Minds project was reviewed.

Again, it was noted that the apportioned costs have been recognised within the general fund throughout the project to date. The trustees note retrospectively that these should have been allocated to this fund throughout this project.

Therefore, the trustees consider it reasonable to transfer the balance of the apportioned costs to date the general fund to effectively repay these in order to show the true value of this fund as of 31st March 2022.
